Message from the Global RCE Service Centre:

Dear colleagues and friends,

With the growth of the RCE community, we have seen the growth and maturation of its systems of coordination. More RCE members and stakeholders are facilitating various activities, assisting new members, participating in strategic development and in network expansion. While the days of us all being in regular and direct touch with each other have passed, we hope that as a community we are cultivating a system that keeps us all together.

This system, which is still evolving, is very familiar to some but might be new to others and so we would like to take this opportunity to introduce the people and organizations who help us create maximum synergies of action at the international level. Among them:

The Ubuntu Committee of Peers – Members of international, educational and scientific organizations review new RCE candidates and make recommendations on their acknowledgement to UNU. They also provide advice on strategic directions for development and other required support. More info by <u>clicking here.</u>

Regional Advisors – Jos Hermans (Europe), Chuck Hopkins (Americas), Mario Tabucanon (Asia-Pacific) and Goolam Mohamedbhai (Africa) assist the RCE community in various ways, ranging from information-sharing and providing networking opportunities with regionally located organizations to addressing individual RCE concerns. Regional advisors are appointed by UNU-IAS and are chosen for their ESD expertise and their long institutional memories of the RCE community in their respective regions.

Regional Coordinators – Selected by the RCEs in their respective regions, Regional Coordinators help coordinate inter-RCE activities, including information exchange, identifying joint actions, and engagement with other regions. Won Byun (RCE Tongyeong) works with a Coordinating Committee made up of various RCE members to help coordinate efforts in the Asia-Pacific region, Detlev Landau-Bank (RCE Oldenburger Munsterland) and Jane Claricoates (RCE Wales) facilitate RCEs in Europe. Dick Kachilonda (RCE KwaZulu Natal) supports RCEs in Africa. Regional Coordinators work closely with Regional Advisors and the Global RCE Service Centre on different across-RCE activities.

The coordination of the RCE community is – and will always be – under development, with more regions forming their strategies and defining engagement approaches and with more people taking charge of thematic and strategic activities. This is a sign of the vitality and resilience of the consortium.

You may have noticed in previous bulletins that we have started sharing interviews with our Regional Advisors, including Charles Hopkins in this issue. We will continue to share stories about our Regional Advisors, Coordinators and all members of the RCE community in bulletins to come. Featured RCE Member: Charles Hopkins

Regional Advisor for the Americas



1. Where does your passion for ESD come from?

It grew out of my involvement in outdoor education, which eventually led to the invention of environmental education. I soon realized however, that environmental education didn't have the strength or the numbers to be able to accomplish what needed to be done. So when the idea came about to engage all of education, instead of trying to add something to existing education, I saw hope for this new approach of education for sustainable development and became more involved. Right now I'm extremely encouraged and hopeful about the link between ESD and the whole concept of a quality education for all. Now what I'm doing is linking to see how addressing social, economic and environment issues that are relevant to the students is improving the quality of their education.

2. What do you enjoy most about your role as an RCE Regional Advisor for the Americas region?

Learning! Everywhere I go I try to listen to the wealth of knowledge and the good-heartedness of people who really want to contribute to building a more sustainable future. I find that so rewarding. I would never be able to learn what I've learned by reading books or taking a university course. Instead I get to sit down and have a beer with someone, often from another culture, and they're willing to share their experience and knowledge with me to try and improve a small piece of the world.

3. What is the greatest opportunity you see for RCEs in the Americas in the coming year?

There is tremendous trust, friendship and bonding happening here in the Americas region now that we've had our second meeting. There is also a great desire to learn from one another because while we are really quite diverse culturally yet we have many things in common: all of our communities have people living in poverty, we have common issues around the education of indigenous peoples, we're almost all resource-based economies. Coming together like this is a real opportunity – we have issues in common and we have vastly different political views but if one believes in cultural diversity and biological diversity, maybe we can also approach seeking economic diversity with respect.

4. What are your personal ambitions for the year ahead?

My real ambition at the moment is to push on with this link between ESD and quality education, which is a global project. I'm also extremely interested in how we improve education for indigenous people because I think what we learn there will also serve other students in our school systems that we're under-serving and under-educating. Right now our world's education systems favour those whose preferred learning style is reading – if you aren't of that category there's very little chance of you going to university and unfortunately today university not only means extra income, it also has a huge impact on a person's well-being, self-esteem and so on. That's really where I'm focusing my attention now.

5. Tell us something about yourself that most people in the RCE network don't know.

Probably what most don't know is that during my 15 years as a principal, every teacher in my staff was given the power of veto over anything that happened in the school. The teachers knew our budgets and policies, and they knew they could change it all if they wanted to. The power of veto was exercised only three times during all my years as a principal and when I look back now, I realize the person who used the veto was right. I really felt the school belonged to the teachers and to the students. I didn't give the students the veto, but for the teachers it was a way for them to feel pride and ownership in their work and what they were doing. It really was about us as a collective.

The UNECE Steering Committee meeting and the UNESCO-UNECE regional consultation meeting on the assessment and follow up of the UN Decade on ESD are both taking place in early 2013. A hard copy of a publication on "learning for the future", which was made possible thanks to generous support from the Netherlands, will be distributed in hard copy form at the meeting. New Online Guide to 'Quality and Education for Sustainability in Higher Education'

The University of Gloucestershire has led a unique sector wide research project, which aimed to change the face of the higher education curriculum to make it more relevant to global sustainability challenges. Funded through the Higher Education Funding Council for England's (HEFCE) Leadership Governance and Management Fund, it is the largest national project to deal with sustainability as a curriculum and whole-of-institution priority. The online guide contains video clips, insights, tips and adaptable tools for institutions, to support them in embedding EfS through quality assurance and enhancement systems.

At institutional level, five pilot universities (University of Gloucestershire, Aston University, University of Brighton, University of Exeter and Oxford Brookes University) developed curriculum change projects to connect EfS with their current approaches to teaching and learning quality. The experiences and lessons from the pilots are embedded in the <u>resource</u>.

Former UNU Rector Hans van Ginkel Lecture

The founder of the RCE movement and former rector of United Nations University, Hans van Ginkel, recently delivered a lecture at the UNU Institute of Advanced Studies. During his lecture he noted how *Regional Centers of Expertise on Sustainable Development*, based on the principles of the *Regional Centres of Expertise on Education for Sustainable Development*, could serve an important function in acquiring information, in planning and in decision-making around sustainable development issues. Thinking about education for sustainable development beyond 2014, he highlighted how it would be important to further promote and strengthen the mobilization of people and knowledge

RCE Munich: Recommendations for Research and Education

Colleagues at RCE Munich would like to share a video lecture on education and research for transformation, which may prove useful. It is the last part of the lecture «World in Transition- A Social Contract for Sustainability« offered by members of the <u>German Advisory Council on Global Change</u> (WBGU). The WBGU is an independent, scientific advisory body to the German federal government. The lecture, 11 <u>Recommendations for Research and Education</u> by Prof. Dr. Reinhold Leinfelder Institute of Geological Science Berlin, highlights: strong cooperation between science and society; inter- and transdisciplinarity, as well as participation are important structural requirements for research and education supporting transformation; problem analysis and communication is a major issue for the transformation; research and education for the transformation are strongly interconnected; and new ways for education and research would demand new curricula, cources and institutions.
