Whole-Institution Approaches

McMillan & Dyball (2009): a whole-of-university approach to sustainability "explicitly links the research, educational and operational activities" of the university, "engag[ing] students in each, rather than confining their education solely to the classroom"



UNESCO's (2014): whole-institution approaches encompass mainstreaming sustainability into all aspects of the learning environment. This includes embedding sustainability in curriculum and learning processes, facilities and operations, interaction with the surrounding community, governance and capacity-building"



Whole Region (& "Region of Regions") Approach

Each organization in larger regional setting like a student in a school/university

Identify <u>existing</u> linkages between organizations at regional, continental, & global scales



• Especially pan-organizational structures: governmental regulators, industry and union associations, umbrella organizations (ex., United Way, multi-faith organizations)

Find gaps and build new social capital






ESD, Global Institutions & Ethical Identities

Government: ex., UN system and Global Citizenship

Business: ex., Trade Agreements, Supply Chains and Sustainable Livelihoods

Academic: ex. UNU, IAU and Sustainable Scholarly Livelihoods through Living Laboratories

- Academic freedom empowering communities
- Community questions & participation unlocking abundance for all (including HEIs)





Creating a Global ESD Movement

Solidarity: No HEI left behind, No region left behind, No country left behind, No continent left behind

Respect For & Encouraging Difference: diversity in livelihoods, organizations, peoples, and regions a resource

Rooted in Culture: Indigenous communities, faith traditions, cultural groups, service clubs/fraternal organizations

- Need for multiple knowledges
- Critical mass of resources

Hospitality to "outsiders" (and "insiders")

 Essential for self-understanding (whether organizational, regional, national, or continental)
